The biggest change this year was a unique floor plan. Jack McAndrew of Skyline Displays helped me out tremendously. He created a new floor layout which worked well. Skyline donated the truss for our entrance way and the tabletop displays for the National Museum of Broadcasting. Overall response on the new floor layout was great by the exhibitors. 

My favorite exhibit at this year's convention was an idea I had when I took this convention on. Preserve the past and suport a good cause. The National Museum of Broadcasting, located in Wilkinsburg, is a non-profit organization that has been on a long quest to save our roots in television and radio broadcasting. They have preserved monumental antiques from the beginning days of radio and television broadcasting. Incredibly, they have even salvaged Frank Conrad's garage, the site of the first radio broadcasts. It is in storage and waiting for a home.

Rick Harris and Lee Schaeffer presented an amazing exhibit of early television and radio broadcast equipment and photographs. The exhibit included a working Dumont camera, bearing WQED's original logo, displayed on an antique monitor and using cabling from WDTV (KDKA). They had a replica of the first microphone for radio broadcast, an antique television, classic cathedral radios, interesting historical photos, clips of early televisions programs, and interesting facts about broadcasting firsts.

OOPS, Missed At Least One

We received an email from the daughter of a Pittsburgh radio transmitter engineer who was not mentioned in our article on the topic of retired radio engineers last month.

Of course, there were many others who were also not mentioned, and Dave Tepe reports that he remembers others every day who he didn't recall while writing the original article.

According to Lucy (Calabrese) Wargo, Michael William Calabrese worked at the WWSW transmitter which was located on Cemetery Lane from 1952-1977 with "Si" Siebel, Frank Lachima, and Hank Kaiser. He was a radio engineer for 25 years at the radio station before being let go after the station automated in the mid-70's. He is now deceased.

I worked at the WWSW transmitter site in the summer of 1971 and I remember the name of Michael Calabrese. It's a dim memory since it was largely solitary work at the transmitter which is located away from the studio site. Perhaps that is why he wasn't mentioned; transmitter guys are often out of sight and out of mind!
